1. Why is it important for NT believers to spend time studying the OT?
2. What is important about establishing the link between Genesis and Exodus?
3. What does Exodus 1:1-7 teach us about God?
4. Take a few minutes to scan thru the book of Exodus. List some of the major events, subjects and themes addressed.
5. Why is an understanding of the NT important to our understanding of Exodus? I.e., why can we not fully understand Exodus apart from the NT?
6. Philip Ryken refers to Exodus as “the gospel of the OT”. What does he mean?
7. What are some of the parallels between the deliverer/deliverance of OT Israel, and the Christian’s deliverer/deliverance?
8. What are some of the theological themes found in Exodus that are more fully developed in the NT?
9. What are some of the questions you have about the book of Exodus?



Personal Reflection and Response

1. Read God’s promises to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob to multiply them (e.g., Gen. 12:2; 13:16; 15:5; 17:6; 18:18; 22:17; 26:4; 28:14; 35:11; 48:4). Also review Genesis 37-47 and the way Israel was led into Egypt. Now re-read Exodus 1:1-7. What lessons does this teach us about God?
2. As preparation for our next study, read Exodus 1:8-22. Record your observations of the passage. Write down your questions and suggest possible answers to your questions.
